Developmental Psychopathology

- Is IQ related to psychiatric symptoms in children? Does high IQ provide resilience to all psychopathology, or does it create an alternative expression of psychopathology?
- How does developmental level relate to internalizing and externalizing symptoms of depression?
- In what way does depression in individuals with mental retardation differ from those with typical cognitive functioning?
